

#### Andrea Griffiths-James (née James) (OS 81)

Andrea writes this update:

I was 58 when my husband of nearly 30 years died of a brain tumour. After looking after him for two years I decided not to return to my original job in Sustainability for a Housing Association.

In the years before my 60th Birthday, I retrained as a Zumba Instructor and Group Exercise instructor but didn't really pursue my career or in truth have the confidence to instruct - I was nearly 60 and a bit overweight. My 60th Birthday proved the catalyst. I was going to do this. Fitness Instructing or give up on my dream - ten months later I teach six classes a week at two Leisure Centres. My classes aren't for the "over 50s " - they are open to everyone and include Kettlebells , Circuit Training and Body Conditioning. Once I started, I absolutely loved it and my confidence grew - I love instructing and am a stickler for making sure people do the exercises correctly.

The feedback I get is tremendous and so supportive from the participants in my classes and I spend a lot of time curating interesting exercise combinations and really good music (though my punk roots still flinch at playing '80s pop!). I am a massive fan of the new dance music. Capital Dance is my go-to radio station - before it was Radio 4!

This is the best job I have ever had - I positively skip or lunge walk to my classes. I only do the classes in the first half of the week which allows me to indulge my other my passion of travelling, either discovering Scandinavia with my daughter or traversing the UK with my dog. Incidentally, my first dog at the age of 55 you certainly can teach an old dog new tricks!
