Genealogy Expertise in Zürich

At the beginning of February, Christine Cocks (née Bennett) (OS 69) was invited out to the Rietberg Museum, in Zürich, to attend the Benin Forum, and investigation by Swiss Museums into how they acquired Benin Art treasures. An interim report was presented to a delegation from Nigeria, and due to her expertise in genealogy, Christine was cited in the report.

Of her participation, Christine said "A Swiss-based researcher, Alice Herzog recruited me to the *Swiss Benin Initiative*: investigating the provenance of Benin Bronzes, whose source may have been the 1897 British Punitive Expedition, when our army pillaged Benin's palace and deposed the King. I did some "work", via email; then, in early Dec 2021, I met Alice at the British Museum and had the privilege of looking at many African artefacts through the eyes of the curator. I had already helped avoid a wrong research-route and found additional research lines in other cases.

"In late 2022, Alice invited me to the Benin Forum, at the Rietberg Museum, Zürich, on 2 Feb 2023. The Forum was a wonderful experience and I felt truly privileged to have been invited. It began with formal introductions, continued with the presentation of the report

on the two-year project, then the formal presentation to the Nigerian delegation, of printed copies. Afterwards, the formal Q&A panel-session helped me to grasp, more deeply, just how important the project is, with huge ethical implications – putting right a grave historical wrong. I also learned that, unusually, the Swiss museums had been initiators of the conversation with the Nigerian "stakeholders". That interaction has proved immensely fruitful in improving the understanding of the artefacts. Nigerian help was able to identify which "suspect" pieces were not, in fact, Nigerian at all, or had been made after 1897. The Nigerians who'd travelled to Switzerland were at last able to see and touch artefacts that they'd only seen in photographs – and it was very clear that that had been profoundly important to them."

Emily will also have a trade stand at the Country Living Christmas Fair in Harrogate, which runs from 30th November until 3rd December.




