REMINISCENCES & UPDATES

Roger Kenyon (OS 59)

Roger Kenyon has written to us with an update of his time after Stamford. He told us: I was a member of Byard House, under the care of Bartle Frere. I left to go to St. Andrews University in 1959. Dan Maland had been my history master in the sixth form and he sent me to be interviewed by Professor Lionel Butler who was Professor of Mediaeval History. I was accepted and Lionel Butler became a good friend.

I went, by accident, into the engineering industry. In those days, preparation for

one's career was not that common, but I didn't want to be a teacher, which was the main alternative. I worked in Lincoln at a company called Ruston and Hornsby, who made diesel engines and industrial gas turbines. I ended up with Tube Investments Ltd that, in the 1960s, had a great reputation for training. I then became Area Manager for Latin America and the Caribbean, where the Latin I had had to continue studying at St. Andrews helped me in learning Spanish.

After several years, I was sent to Mexico where I've lived for over forty years and now I'm virtually retired. It was supposed to be a temporary posting!

Recently I've been in touch with Steve Riley (OS 66), and Mike Perkins (OS 59) who became a business partner with my uncle Geoff Cooper in Market Rasen.

My brother Simon (OS 63) ended up as Professor of Veterinary Medicine at Purdue University. He's now retired and lives in Maryland in a small fishing village. He looks after a Nature Refuge, as acting (and probably unpaid!) Secretary. He married and had 3 children, two of whom are in the USA, and the elder in New Zealand.

I have many happy memories of Stamford School, both academically and athletically: I was Captain of Fencing and played cricket for the School and for Byard. At St. Andrews I fenced for the University and for Scotland.

Nigel Fox (OS 52)

John Cartwright (OS 53) informed us of the sad passing of Nigel Fox on 20 August 2022. John writes:

Nigel Thomas Fox died on the 20 August 2022. He was at school from 1945 to 1952, having boarded in Northfields House initially and then becoming a founder

member of Byard House in 1951. He and I were close friends. After leaving School, he joined the Army for National Service. He was commissioned in the Royal Artillery and joined 48 Field Regiment, serving in Malaya during the Emergency, being attached to the Ghurka Regiment.

After leaving the Army in 1959, he joined Shakespear McTurk and Graham in Leicester, eventually becoming Senior partner. He also became a Director of Leicester Cattle market. He retired in 2006.

He is survived by his wife, Pauline and his son and daughter, Anthony and Alex.

Andrew (Garth Taylor) (OS 70)

Sadly, the Club have been notified of the passing of Andrew (Garth) Taylor on 1 September 2022 by his stepbrother, Ian Russell.

From the committee:

Born in 1953 at Essendine, for most of his youth Garth grew up in Ryhall. He started at Stamford School, Willoughby House, in 1963 with his leg in plaster following a weekend football game, but typical of his determined attitude to any challenge he adapted quickly and soon enjoyed a full range of school activities. Rugby became his favourite sport where he represented both Ancaster 1st XV and the School 2nd XV. (*highlighted in the picture below - click photo to enlarge*)



Garth enjoyed "rock" music, attending the iconic Isle of White Festival in 1970 along with a number of school friends.

He gained a degree in Sociology at Leicester University. After meeting his wife

Catherine in Leeds, they moved to London spending 40 years in Lee and were blessed with two sons, Luke and Sam.

Garth was a civil servant starting at a job centre in Brixton. He progressed to work on education and skills for SOLOTEC in the 1990's, before becoming a Partnership Director for the Learning and Skills Council in Croydon in the 2000's. He retired at the national Skills Funding Agency at the age of 58.

He was passionate about sport, playing for the Old Brockleians RFC and undertaking many charity cycle rides. He was interviewed by the BBC as a cancer survivor riding for Beat Bowel Cancer. He also raised money for Parkinsons and The Royal British Legion.

Sincere condolences are passed to Garth's family. He will be sadly missed by all who knew him.
